Culture of Quality (COQ)

The Ohio Association of County Behavioral Health Authorities (OACBHA) awarded Board Certification to The Mental Health, Alcohol & Drug Addiction Recovery Board of Putnam County. This is the highest level of certification that a local behavioral health Board can receive. The independent association of county alcohol, drug addiction, and mental health boards provides three-year certifications to Boards that can demonstrate compliance with 140 standards.



OACBHA awards certification to Boards that demonstrate substantial fulfillment of its standards. These standards include compliance to Medicaid rules, risk management and insurance, health and safety, human resources, mission and program, governance, finance and operations, continuous quality improvement, and ethics.

Board Members

A diverse group mandated to plan for, contract, monitor and evaluate services in the community. The volunteer Board is comprised of Putnam County residents who are appointed by the Ohio Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services and Putnam County Commissioners. Monthly Meetings of the Board are held at 12pm on the first Friday of the month at Henry's Restaurant. (excluding January and July)

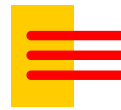

Recovery Housing– Assist individuals who are active in recovery from substance use disorders. Recovery Housing provides an alcohol and drug-free living environment, peer support, assistance with getting addiction treatment and other recovery services.

Drug– Free Workforce– Objectives are to increase an employable, drug-free workforce in Ohio; build healthier, more productive and economically sound workplaces; and create systems to educate employees- to prevent drug use now and in the future. The initiative brings together local stakeholders and businesses to create individualized drug-free workforce plans.

Stepping Up Initiative- A national effort to divert individuals with mental illness from jails and into treatment. The initiative is a collaborative effort to meet the needs of the mentally ill that revolve in and out of local correctional facilities.

Crisis Text Line– Provides free support at your fingertips, 24/7. It is a free, confidential service available via text on mobile devices. It is intended to broaden the options available through current community crisis hotlines. Crisis Text Line's goal is to move people from a hot moment to a cool calm. Crisis Text Link is there anytime, day or night, to help those in need. An individual may text the keyword **4HOPE** to **741741** and expect a reply from a trained volunteer crisis counselor within five minutes. The message is confidential, anonymous, and secure.

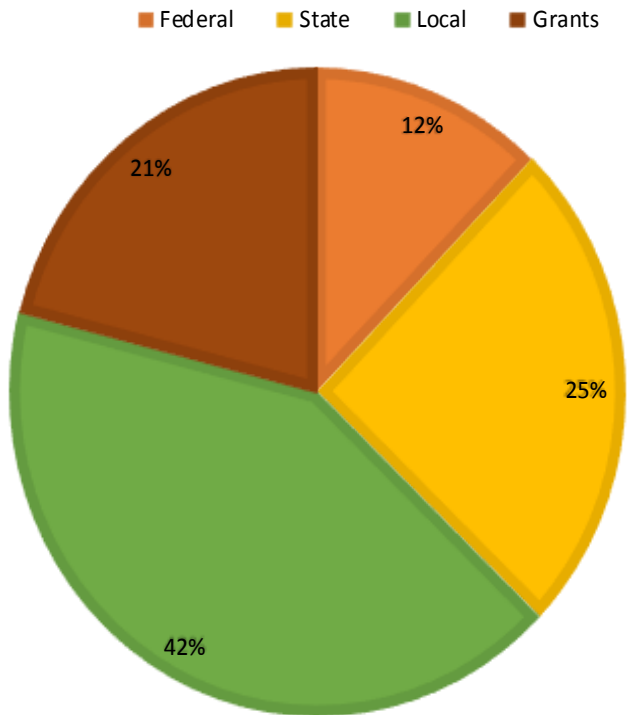
Respite- Provides short-term temporary relief to the informal, unpaid caregiver of a person under the age of 21 in order to support and preserve the primary caregiver relationship. Respite care targets those involved in a multiple child-serving system that have a mental health diagnosis.

Opiate Task Force– A committee consisting of over 40 county representatives with a common interest to; strengthen county and community efforts to prevent and treat opioid addiction, educate youth and adults about the dangers of opioid addiction and the negative effects it has on society, promote family building and workforce development, and encourage community engagement.
